After her Bond Desk assignment, Investigator Stanton found her niche in the Warrant Execution Section. She has a knack for finding criminals hiding in ceilings, under houses and other place people normally wouldn't go.

Back in 2007 Investigator Stanton stopped a jail escape by going after a convicted felon, who had shimmied into a crawl space in the ceiling of the jail while waiting in a holdover cell. Investigator Stanton with her training knew where to look and found the inmate. Investigator ensured that the inmate found his way back to the holding cell.
